From the Director of FAM

After a three-year hiatus, FAM is once again presenting our **Annual Report and FAMily Album**. During this time, we have continued to successfully deliver our mission of art, education, and community health and well-being, with partners from across our region and beyond. Our most significant achievement was the ratification of a new Strategic Plan for 2024–2028, including a revised Mission Statement and, for the first time, our Core Institutional Values (see opposite page). The full Strategic Plan can be found on FAM's website.

In 2023 and 2024, FAM fully replaced antiquated HVAC (heating, ventilation, and air conditioning) systems throughout the four buildings of our 40,000-square-foot physical plant. The new system provides for greater control, flexibility, comfort, and safety for visitors, staff, and our Permanent Collection of over 8,000 artworks. We are proud to have received a 2024 MassSave Climate Leader Award, for FAM's "efforts in increasing energy efficiency and reducing greenhouse gas emissions in the Commonwealth."

Our time and capacity were also spent contributing to the economic and community development of Fitchburg and North Central Massachusetts. In early 2025, the Fitchburg Arts Community opened to tenants (more on this on page 8). And in 2022, FAM was instrumental in winning Fitchburg a Creative Cities Designation from MassDevelopment's Transformative Development Initiative program. For two years, FAM led this effort which invested \$535,000 in local arts and culture infrastructure, programs, training, and leadership development. FAM's partnership work with the City of Fitchburg, NewVue Communities, Fitchburg State University, and others has attracted over \$200 million in arts and culture investment to Fitchburg over the last few years.

Now we begin preparations for the celebration of our Centennial! FAM was incorporated in December, 1925, and opened to the public in 1929, and we have been instrumental to the history, culture, and identity of our community ever since.

Many thanks to everyone who has made all this good work possible: our Staff, Trustees, Community Advisors, Individual and Corporate Members, volunteers, community partners, donors, visitors, and program participants - in short, our FAMily.

FAM Exhibitions

Over the past year, FAM continued to present stellar exhibitions of artworks both from our Permanent Collection, and by New England contemporary artists. All FAM exhibitions are organized in-house by FAM Curatorial Staff - in order to best focus on our collections and our community, we do not host traveling exhibitions.

FAM Collection

In FY2025, FAM added fifty-four artworks to our core collections of American Art, African Art, and photography, with a special emphasis on artworks by African and African-American artists, and contemporary American photographers.

Recent acquisitions of African Art include a collection of African tribal arts, gifted by the late Simon Gregory and Family. Simon was a long-time FAM Community Advisor, and great supporter of our African Art collection. In addition, FAM Community Advisor Dr. Richard Ndi and Dr. Eric Mbunwe donated multiple objects from the ceremonial royal regalia of the Mbum People in their native Cameroon, and FAM Trustee Nadine "Toddy" Martel gifted several traditional Egyptian pictorial applique textiles. FAM also added to our collection of 21st-century African photography with the purchase of works by Rahima Gambo (Nigeria), Miora Rajaonary (Madagascar), and Ibrahima Thiam (Senegal).

In 2025, FAM acquired artworks by George Annan, bashexo, Lou Jones, and Fitchburg artist Digi Chivetta, all of whom participated in the group exhibition **Dialogues, Diasporas, and Detours through Africa**. This 2023 show was a collaboration with WHERE ARE ALL THE BLACK PEOPLE AT, a Boston-based collective of artists, educators, and activists devoted to increasing the representation of Black artists in museum collections.

FAM also received gifts of work by contemporary photographers Bill Armstrong, Stephen DiRado, Carlota Duarte, Yoav Horesh, and Richard Misrach.

FAM Education

In 2025, FAM Director of Education Susan Diachisin and Manager of Programs Suzanne Hauerstein focused on strengthening our institutional partnerships and co-creating high-impact programs with the Fitchburg Public Schools (FPS) and Fitchburg State University (FSU). FPS programs included our Arts-Based After-School Program for middle-school students, Summer Camp at FAM, and exhibition tours for all 4th- and 7th-grade students, and professional development sessions for teachers. At FSU, FAM educators worked with students in the Education Program, and hosted a capstone intern. FAM curators co-taught Communications/Media classes in which FSU students created and published exhibition catalogues and marketing collateral for the Museum as part of a twelve-year ongoing collaboration. And, in 2025, FSU's new President, Dr. Donna Hodge, joined FAM's governing Board of Trustees.

In addition to this partnership work, our Education Department conducted tours and educational activities for students from Clark University, Mount Wachusett Community College, the Rhode Island School of Design, the Audre Lorde Transformative Arts School, St. Bernard's Elementary School, the National Museum of Women in the Arts, and several homeschool groups. FAM educators also coordinated our Community Gallery shows, Learning Lounges, artist and curator talks, family programs, Creative Discoveries (art therapy for people in recovery, with the Worcester County Sheriff's Department), and Hidden Treasures, a special program for people with memory loss and their caregivers.

Featured Partner: NewVue Communities

On January 11, 2013, barely a month after Nick Capasso became Director of the Fitchburg Art Museum, Marc Dohan, Executive Director of NewVue Communities (then, the Twin Cities Community Development Corporation) came to FAM to pitch the idea of forming a partnership to create artist preference affordable housing in three buildings across the street from FAM: the B.F. Brown Middle School (1923), the Fitchburg City Stable (1889), and the Fitchburg Academy - more recently, "The Annex" (1869) – where FAM founder Eleanor Norcross had both attended and taught high school.

Twelve years later, the Fitchburg Arts Community is complete, as tenants began moving into one, two, and three-bedroom units in early 2025. Together, FAM and NewVue rescued three beautiful historical buildings from demolition, provided sixty-eight units of high-quality housing during a national housing crisis, put three buildings on the municipal tax rolls for the first time, stabilized the Elm Street neighborhood and its property values, and planted a big flag in Fitchburg that proclaims: "Creative Economy Welcome Here!"

NewVue took the lead on this project as developer, and did all the heavy lifting: property acquisition, fundraising, financing, hiring architects, contractors, and property managers, and attending to a host of real estate and construction details that no museum could manage. FAM played a supporting role, assisting with local education and advocacy, research, design of workspaces and artist amenities, marketing, and fundraising. And the Museum is now committed to working with tenants to help strengthen the creative community that they are now building.

Thanks to our strategic partnership, NewVue Communities and the Fitchburg Art Museum have made a major contribution to our community. The creation of the Fitchburg Arts Community would have been utterly impossible without our strong, cooperative relationship, and without the help of other partners including the City of Fitchburg, Fitchburg State University, the Working Cities Challenge of the Federal Reserve Bank in Boston, Relmagine North of Main, The Health Foundation of Central Massachusetts, MassDevelopment's Transformative District Initiative, the Barr Foundation, the Klarman Family Foundation, and many others.






